Put the bottle in a sealed plastic bag before depositing it in the box.</p> <hr/> <p style="text-align: center;">EpiPens</p> <p>Please dispose of EpiPens at the Sheboygan Police Department box.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">NO NEEDLES IN THE BOXES—Where to dispose of needles:</p> <p>St. Nicholas Hospital's Emergency Department in Sheboygan maintains a free drop off box for needles. Contaminated sharps must be placed in an approved red, plastic, puncture-proof container or a used plastic laundry detergent bottle labeled "sharps"—No larger than 11 x 7.5 inches.</p>
